Teaching Self-Appraisal

In my first semester as a full-time professor at Texas Tech, I succeeded in guiding viola students through a transitional period. From the beginning of school year, I established a respectful rapport with the students and made sure that the students kept harmonious relationships with each other. I succeeded in providing a supportive and challenging atmosphere in my studio. My teaching was effective, because I catered to the needs of each individual student. In private lessons, students responded positively to concentration on fundamentals combined with open musical expression. I introduced new concepts and materials while incorporating ideas from previous teachers. To help build a strong and nurturing studio, I revived and directed the "Viola Choir!". While coaching this ensemble and various other chamber music groups, I passed on my passion for ensemble playing and the collaborative spirit. I prepared students for recitals, competitions, and graduate school prescreened recordings. I encouraged students to take advantage of performance opportunities and projects that lead to advancement or further study. One of my students was a runner up in the string area concerto competition. Two students were accepted for live auditions for the graduate school at Rice University. I guided a DMA student through his chamber music recital and also assisted a junior through preparations for her first ever solo viola recital. My hope is to build and instill confidence, self respect, and effortless communication in my students at Texas Tech. I believe that I have shown my ability to positively impact students through teaching them to find their own individual voice.

During my first semester at Texas Tech, I was able to fulfill my job as an artist-performer by staying active and performing at the highest level. As a chamber musician collaborating with other faculty members of the School of Music, I premiered "Crossroads" by John Harbison. I promoted new music by performing then West Texas premiere of Kenji Bunch's "The 3 Gs". As a soloist, I presented a faculty recital which featured varied repertoire from the viola literature. In August, I took the audition for and was appointed to the position of principal viola of the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra. I've lead the viola section in eight concerts this season. Several of my students are members of the section, and I feel that I have been successful in teaching them about professional orchestral technique and etiquette. I've made connections with musicians from outside of Lubbock including playing with Harry Connick Jr. and his band. I believe it is important to embrace the opportunity to work with performers outside of the classical world so that I am able to experience various genres of music. I established relationships within the department by volunteering to play on Jeffrey Lastrapes' faculty recital and I also performed in a viola quartet on a student's DMA chamber music recital. My chamber group, the Atlantic Chamber Ensemble, was awarded the 2014 Adventurous Programming Award from Chamber Music America for the programs we presented in 2013.

Professor Sparr has turned the viola studio toward a much more positive and constructive path in the few months she has been at TTU. In an atmosphere of information overload for new faculty members, Dr. Sparr has recognized that building a solid studio of violists is paramount, and has sought advice from many about the best ways to achieve that result. In my second year of teaching at Texas Tech, I aim to set students on a path for success both in their music and in their lives. I strive for the pursuit of excellence in teaching and attempt to develop new ideas, ways of thinking, and methods for a greater understanding of the physics of the viola. I have coached quite a bit of chamber music and feel that the skills learned in my coachings can be applied to professional situations and establishing high level of playing and meaningful music making. I am currently compiling a record of original concepts that assist violists in expressing musical ideas through technical practices and am considering many of these ideas for future presentations and possibly a published article or book.I am encouraged by the developments of my students and I am happy to report the successes of several of my students this year. Two of my viola students were accepted to graduate schools at Indiana University and the University of Houston on full scholarships. One of my viola students finished his DMA degree. I had many performances in Texas and beyond in 2014. I feel that I expanded my scope of performances and am a much more confident solo performer and teacher. Highlights of concerts at Texas Tech were the Faculty String Quartet's Beethoven Op. 18 Project (which will continue through 2015) and guest appearances in faculty recitals of Annie Chalex Boyle and Lisa Garner.

I have continued to play in Lubbock Symphony for a second season. This year, I was fortunate to play major orchestral viola solos (Vaughan Williams and Elgar) with positive feedback from audience and orchestra members. In my role as principal of the orchestra, I am hoping to act as a representative and quality example for the School of Music at Texas Tech University. In August, I was awarded a one week residency at Avaloch Institute in New Hampshire where I was (with my pianist) able to concentrate on solo repertoire and a piece written for me. My time at Avaloch was spent improving and informing my craft and creative process. In New York this summer at the Lake George Music Festival, I performed chamber music with some of the finest young players from both the east and west coasts. I feel that it is important to make connections for future collaborations. I continued in my role as assistant principal viola of the Colorado Music Festival. I served as acting principal for the first weeks of the festival leading a section composed of members of professional orchestral violists across the US. I also played chamber music with members of Charlotte Symphony, Iris Orchestra, Toledo Symphony, and Florida State University faculty. I continue to perform and program concerts with my chamber group, the Atlantic Chamber Ensemble which won the ASCAP award for Adventurous Programming from Chamber Music America in January 2014. I established a new relationship with Chamber Music Amarillo and am scheduled to present more fine concerts with them in the future. A big highlight of my year was performing all of the Brandenburg Concertos in one evening and being featured as a soloist in Brandenburg 6. It was thrilling to be able to share this experience with my fellow string faculty.

After reviewing the Annual Report Submitted by Dr. Sparr along with viola class and applied viola lesson visits and discussion, the committee provides the following assessment:

TEACHING

Now in her second year at Texas Tech, Dr. Sparr has a viola class of moderate size, and she is dedicated to increasing the quantity and quality of the viola studio. Dr. Sparr has engaged in recruiting activities in Midland, Houston, and Lubbock, and is committed to continuing recruiting activities in the state and beyond. She has cultivated a supportive environment with - and between - all the viola students, and she appears to be well liked by her students. As a pedagogue, Dr. Sparr is energetic and passionate, addressing: performance issues, intonation, tension, mitigating student tension and pain, strategic and customized choice of repertoire, detailed technical instruction of both the right and left hands, fingering guidance (with flexibility), musical/artistic instruction, and reviews concepts presented in the lesson, with plans for the next lesson. She uses her natural sense of humor in the service of teaching. As a result, her students perform at a high level; and two recent graduates were awarded full rides at prestigious universities (Indiana University and University of Houston).

RESEARCH

Dr. Sparr has grown noticeably as a performer. Locally, her contributions as a performer and section leader in the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra have been positive, in particular, her viola solos in the LSO have been consistently beautiful. Her performance in the Texas Tech faculty quartet's Beethoven Op. 18 Concert Series Project have also been impressive. Regionally, her performance with Chamber Music Amarillo of all 6 Brandenburg Concerti, in particular her solo role in the 6th, was of a high standard. Her creative work beyond the State of Texas includes: chamber music performances at the Lake George Music Festival in upstate New York, and as a Soloist for a one week residency at the Avaloch Institute in New Hampshire, including a piece written especially for her. Dr. Sparr continues to perform with her chamber group, the Atlantic Chamber Ensemble, which won the ASCAP award for Adventurous Programing from Chamber Music America in January of 2014. Also in 2014, Dr. Sparr released a CD on Centaur Records music composed by her husband, "Sound Harmonies with Air" (2) 21207 Chamber Music of

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D.J. Sparr. Always a big hit with audiences and potential students is Dr. Sparr's performance of "The 3 G's" for solo viola.

SERVICE

In addition to serving on many TTU student recital committees and oral defense committees, she has organized two guest violist masterclasses at Texas Tech, and serves on the board of one local non-profit organization, and another non-profit in Virginia. Dr. Sparr's service contributions are significant for a faculty member in their second year. In addition, her future plans for service is commendable.

OVERALL

Dr. Sparr recognizes the need to increase the quantity of violists in the viola studio, and this committee encourages her current and future efforts in this important area. Her contributions as an artist and teacher are commendable, and her positive energy and passion are appreciated by her students and colleagues. It is recommended that Dr. Sparr pursue more international creative activity, and to further cultivate participation as a faculty/performer in summer music festivals, in particular those that may offer the opportunity for recruiting quality violists.

Halfway through her second year at Texas Tech University, the committee feels that with increased numbers of students in the viola studio, Dr. Kimberly Sparr will be well along toward the ultimate goal of promotion and tenure.

Primary Unit Evaluation Report for 2015

January 31, 2016

After reviewing the Annual Report Submitted by Dr. Sparr, student evaluations along with performances with the Lubbock Symphony orchestra and the TTU Faculty String Quartet, the committee provides the following assessment:

Dr. Kimberley Sparr brings to the School of Music a good deal of professional orchestra experience – bringing to the School of Music attitudes and values found in the professional performing world.

TEACHING

Now in her third year at Texas Tech, Dr. Sparr has a viola class of 10, which is a very respectable size. The studio is becoming her own, and the expectations are high. There are also 3 new grad students and this is significant. 2015 student achievement was particularly impressive. Student evaluations were consistently very positive, She has cultivated a competitive, yet supportive environment in the viola studio and the overall playing level has improved. As a pedagogue, Dr. Sparr is energetic and passionate, striking a unique balance between being demanding, yet friendly and casual. Based on student comments, though, she at times errs on the side of casualness. Perhaps she should fine-tune her equilibrium of how she relates to her students with more emphasis of authority and respect she so richly deserves. Dr. Sparr has honed her lesson structure and her students' practice plans are clearer. Additionally, she started teaching at a summer music festival, the National Music Festival – an important recruiting venue. It is hoped she will continue there, and/or other summer festivals in summers to come

RESEARCH

Dr. Sparr's list of performances is remarkable with 12 falling into the national/international category, including a premiere of a work for viola and electronics in Amsterdam. Clearly, Dr. Sparr is devoted to new music, involved in commissions and premiers. Additionally, she hopes to start her own social justice organization (in conjunction with Lubbock's coalition for Hope) that includes performances of new works and other events. As principal viola at the Lake George Music Festival (NY), she sat across from David Kim, the Concertmaster of the Philadelphia Orchestra. Dr. Sparr's performances with the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra are passionate, energetic and artistic. Similarly she brings and enthusiasm and artistry to her performances with the Texas Tech Faculty Quartet, who just completed their cycle of the Beethoven Op. 18

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Quartets. She also performs as a titled chair in the orchestra of the prestigious Colorado Music Festival.

SERVICE

Dr. Sparr's service contributions are significant for a faculty member in their third year. They include: nine recital committees and one DMA exam committee, Youth Orchestras of Lubbock chamber music program coach; Member, Caerus and Atlantic Chamber Ensemble boards. As her role as interim String Area Chair, she quickly exhibited organizational skills (a meeting agenda and upcoming string event dates) that made the meeting progress with unusual efficiency. Other committee work will come.

OVERALL

Dr. Kimberly Sparr continues to improve the quality and quantity of her studio. She is a performer of national recognition and is making excellent progress towards tenure. Her student evaluations were high with excellent supporting comments.

Dr. Kimberley Sparr brings the School of Music a high commitment to artistic quality, vigor, a passion for performing and teaching, and an infectious friendly energy - all backed up with a noteworthy professional performing career. She is poised to be a significant member of the string faculty team to help build a string department of renown at Texas Tech. With continued momentum of building the quantity and quality of the viola studio, Dr. Kimberly Sparr will be well along the way toward the ultimate goal of promotion and tenure.

I have studied the Mid-Term dossier prepared by Assistant Professor Dr. Kimberly Sparr. I have also reviewed the written report of the Formal Evaluation Committee of five tenured faculty. In accordance with the procedures of the School of Music, the dossier was available for review by all music faculty. All tenured faculty who reviewed Dr. Sparr's dossier were eligible to cast a vote. A formal faculty meeting was held on Wednesday, March 23, 2016 at 4:00 p.m. for that purpose. Based upon this comprehensive review, and my personal observations, I am pleased to recommend that Dr. Kimberly Sparr continue on the tenure track and at the rank of Assistant Professor.

The Formal Evaluation Committee of the School of Music voted as follows:

Note that School of Music policy separates the Formal Evaluation Committee vote from that of the tenured faculty, thereby allowing for only one vote per tenured faculty member. A total vote of the tenured faculty is therefore 34 + 5 = 39 For Continuation, and 0 vote against continuation. It is important to note that there were no written comments submitted by the voting faculty.

Dr. Sparr maintains a dynamic and engaging viola studio. Students express great satisfaction with their individual progress, as well as genuine admiration for the inspired mentorship they receive from Dr. Sparr. In addition, student achievements from the viola studio are impressive, including a winner of the prestigious Presser Scholarship, and national music festival placements.

Dr. Sparr's area of creative scholarship is in performance. She appears to be equally comfortable performing as a solo recitalist, or a chamber music collaborator, or in the full symphony orchestra. A review of Dr. Sparr's vita will reveal local, regional, national,

and international performances. Of special interest is her effort to bring to life new compositions by engaging in commissioning projects. It is worthy of special notice that these new pieces were premiered in a variety of venues from local to international (Amsterdam). In these instances, the level of creative engagement is truly comprehensive and should be celebrated in every positive way possible.

In the area of Service, Dr. Sparr has eagerly served when asked. She is currently acting Chair of the String Area, and her colleagues are most pleased with her leadership. She serves on professional boards for various music organizations in four states, and she is engaged at the local level through clinics and special leadership sessions with the Youth Orchestras of Lubbock, area public schools, and as a performer with the Caerus Ensemble.

It is worthy of special note here that Dr. Sparr is the recipient of the Alumni Association's New Faculty Award for her fine accomplishments in teaching, research/creative scholarship, and service. This award was announced March 22, 2016.

I agree with Dr. Sparr's Formal Evaluation Committee summary assessment, and I believe it bears repeating: "Dr. Sparr is an unusually skilled and gifted violist, whose commitment to teaching, artistry, new music, and social causes is abundantly demonstrated by her professional activities since coming to Texas Tech."

Clearly, Dr. Sparr excels in the areas of Teaching, Creative Scholarship, and Service. There is every reason to believe that her contributions in these areas will continue to blossom over time.

Dr. Kimberly Sparr, Assistant Professor of Viola

After 5 seasons of performing with the Richmond, Virginia Symphony Orchestra as Assistant Principal Viola, and one year as adjunct faculty at The College of William and Mary, and 3 years at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County, Dr. Sparr joined the Texas Tech University School of Music in September, 2013.

She holds the Bachelor of Music from Rice University, the Master of Music from New England Conservatory, and the Doctor of Musical Arts from the University of Maryland.

Kimberly Sparr is a passionate and accomplished performer on the viola with a growing reputation as a chamber musician, and soloist on the instrument. She brings to the School of Music a good deal professional orchestral experience, having played with many orchestras, including: subbing in the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, and the National Symphony Orchestra, principal viola in the Lake George Music Festival Orchestra (NY), and assistant principal viola in the Colorado Music Festival - in addition to her position in the Richmond Symphony. She has long been a very active chamber musician, and has continued that trajectory while at TTU. Her training and experience brings a welcome professional performing perspective to the music students at TTU and the West Texas musical culture at large.

Dr. Sparr is clearly a devoted and passionate advocate of new music. She has expanded the musical boundaries of viola performance through commissions of groundbreaking new works for viola and partnerships with other artists. For example, she has commissioned and performed new works for viola and video, as well as for electric viola. Similarly, Dr. Sparr is the founding violist of the Atlantic Chamber Ensemble whose mission is to make classical music relevant to 21st century audiences. The Atlantic Chamber Ensemble won the ASCAP Adventurous Programming Award for 2014.

Teaching:

Studio Teaching – Numerical scores from student evaluations are extremely high, and the written comments are enthusiastically positive. Dr. Sparr brings to her lessons an infectious and friendly passion and energy that resonates with her students. Her teaching is appropriately multi-faceted, but some pedagogical priorities that particularly caught our attention were 1) An approach mindful of physical issues so that her students can feel comfortable and are therefore free to express their musical vision - an issue particularly important on an inconveniently sized and acoustically imperfect instrument. 2) Utilization of technological resources such as: reference recordings on the internet, video recording of student performance and practice, and Skype lessons. Dr. Sparr regularly volunteers to do Skype lessons with her student over long breaks from the academic year. As result of her devotion to effective teaching, her students have achieved good success such as: winning positions in the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra, acceptance to summer festivals and a full scholarship to Indiana University.

Research/Creative Work:

Dr. Sparr's chamber music performances are impressive and numerous with 16 falling into the national/international category. Additionally, she has made numerous local performances locally, and regionally. Since coming to TTU, her solo performances are fewer (four) than chamber appearances, but does include a world premiere of a commissioned work for solo viola and electronics in Amsterdam, The Netherlands. Dr. Sparr is encouraged to seek out more solo performance opportunities in order to display fully her prodigious performing talents. Orchestrally, she is principal viola of the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra. Dr. Sparr's summer orchestral activities are impressive: she has continued her titled postions in the Colorado Music Festival Orchestra, and Lake George Music Festival Orchestra. Starting summer 2015 has added principal viola of the National Music Festival Orchestra (MD) to her list of summer activities. She has given masterclasses at the University of Southern Missippippi, and Loyola University, and numerous clinics in high schools across Texas – all excellent recruiting activities.

Service:

Dr. Sparr's service to the School of Music includes serving on the Texas Tech School of Music Faculty Chamber Music Series Committee. She has also done an exemplary job as the acting Chair of the String Department during Jeffrey Lastrapes' development leave for the Spring '16 semester, exhibiting unusual organizational skills. She routinely produces and distributes an agenda for each meeting, making the meetings much more efficient and productive than in the past. She has served on the requisite SOM committees as a string faculty, including auditing 25 recital hearings, and served as an adjudicator on 3 SOM competition juries. She has also been involved in two Band and Orchestra Camps. We encourage her to continue to take full advantage of the BOC as an excellent recruitment opportunity. Dr. Sparr's service to the community includes serving on the Board of the Caerus Ensemble, and serving as a clinician to the Youth Orchestras of Lubbock and area high schools. Beyond the local community, she has served as a clinician to quite a number of high schools all over the State of Texas. Broader still, Dr. Sparr serves on the boards and provided service to musical organizations in New Hampshire, New Mexico, and Virginia. Of particular note is her commitment to musical performance in the service of social justice for the Expression of Justice International Justice Mission in The Hague, Netherlands.

Summary:

Dr. Sparr is an unusually skilled and gifted violist, whose commitment to teaching, artistry, new music, and social causes is abundantly demonstrated by her professional activities since coming to Texas Tech. She shares her passions with the students fortunate enough to come under her influence and tutelage. The switch from a predominantly orchestral performing career to a predominantly academic career (though related) brings with it significantly different skill sets and cultural changes. Dr. Sparr is handling what can be a difficult transition with grace, energy and passion. Her professional orchestral experience and broad musical, aesthetic and professional perspective is a welcome asset, particularly to those students whose realm as heretofore been largely confined to the musical sphere of the State of Texas. Descriptive words such as: "energetic," "passionate," "friendly" and "positive" come up frequently in describing Kimberly Sparr. And as such, she is most definitely an asset to the School of Music at TTU, a delightful colleague to her peers, an inspiration to her students, and an exemplary performer.

We encourage Dr. Sparr to continue her recruiting efforts at the local, state, regional, national, and international level through clinics, chamber, and particularly solo performances to maximize the quantity and quality of the viola studio at Texas Tech.

Teaching Self-Appraisal

The TTU viola studio showed growth and fresh energy in 2016 in numbers and in quality of performance. The number of violists increased to thirteen (almost double the size in previous years) and they are playing with more confidence, consistency, and musicality. I spent a lot of time mentoring and have been able to guide students along individualized paths towards their careers. My standards and expectations for excellence are staying strong. I continue to teach and perform by example. Two of my students participated in the string concerto competition finals. We completed our Lillian Fuchs project and initiated a new studio project on Kreutzer Etude #5 in the fall. One challenge I faced was losing two TAs who dropped out in the middle of the academic year. One student was not suited for graduate school (did not possess a desire for practicing or research). The other was not happy with the overall environment at TTU. I managed to make a seamless transition and keep a positive environment in my (then) small (but mighty!) studio. I took over coaching for the graduate quartet in the middle of the year. I invited two guests to present masterclasses – Rudoph Haken from University of Illinois and Renee Skerik from Interlochen. Outside of TTU, I served as mentor faculty at the National Music Festival. I gave masterclasses at James Madison University and TTUBOC. I presented a workshop covering extended techniques at the Walden School. I received two awards: the Texas Tech Alumni Association New Faculty Award for recognition of outstanding dedication to academic achievement and the Mortar Board Apple Polishing Award for excellence in positive academic influence. I continue to instill professionalism in my students and I find them to be very responsive, proactive, and accountable.

Primary Unit Evaluation Report for 2016

February 12, 2017

After reviewing the Annual Report Submitted by Dr. Sparr, student evaluations along with performances with the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra, the committee provides the following assessment:

Dr. Kimberley Sparr brings to Texas Tech a good deal of professional orchestra, chamber and solo experience – bringing attitudes and values found in the professional performing world, as well as effective pedagogical passions and techniques to the School of Music at TTU.

TEACHING

Now in her fourth academic year (2016-17) at Texas Tech, Dr. Sparr has a healthy sized viola class of 14 – an increase of 7 over last year. Because of Dr. Sparr's high expectations and standards, as well as her energetic, positive mentoring of her students, the quality of the studio continues to grow as well as the quantity. Despite having lost two T.A.'s mid academic year (due to no fault of her own), she and the viola studio weathered this setback by attracting two new T.A.'s of even higher quality. Student evaluations were consistently very positive, and the student evaluation numbers are extremely high. Evidence of student success is found with three students hired by the Lubbock Symphony, and another receiving a full scholarship to the National Music Festival. Dr. Sparr took over coaching the graduate string quartet in mid-year. Outside of TTU, Dr. Sparr appeared as faculty mentor at the National Music Festival, gave a masterclass at James Madison University and a workshop at the Walden School. Dr. Sparr received two University teaching awards: the Texas Tech Alumni Association New Faculty Award, and the Mortar Board Apple Polishing Award. Dr. Sparr is encouraged to continue and expand her guest appearances, particularly at summer festivals and venues.

RESEARCH

Dr. Sparr continues her passionate and energetic solo, chamber and orchestral performances at every level, with 8 falling in the national/international category. Locally, her contribution to the Lubbock Symphony is palpable. She is also continuing her commitment to new music performing premieres and commissioning new works. Her video project, "Liquid Fire" is in the final stages. This committee fully supports Dr. Sparr's continued performing appearances at the local, state, regional, national and international levels.

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SERVICE

Dr. Sparr's service contributions have grown over the past year. She proved herself to be an effective and efficient organizer in her duties as acting Chair of the string department in Spring 2016. She organized two masterclasses, and hosted "Music in Familiar Spaces" here in Lubbock while they were on their U.S. tour. Dr. Sparr served on 12 recital committees and one MM composition defense committee. She was appointed to two important CVPA committees: The Awards and Research Committee, and the Deans Advisory Committee, as well as one university-level committee. She Joined the Mentor Tech committee, and continues to serve on the Caerus Ensemble board. Quite an increase in service activities over 2015.

OVERALL

Dr. Kimberly Sparr continues to improve the quality and quantity of her studio. She is a performer of national recognition and is making excellent progress towards tenure. Dr. Sparr suffered serious medical issues that necessitated her being hospitalized and convalescing for a while in 2016. As result, some of her performing, teaching, and summer activities were abridged. Though some students expressed disappointment at their beloved teacher being gone, (all students receive all their due lessons, with some lessons being covered by T.A.'s), student evaluations were high, and her students remain loyal and enthusiastically positive about their experience at the TTU viola studio with Dr. Sparr.

Dr. Sparr has proven herself to have a strong presence as member of the string faculty team at Texas Tech. With continued momentum of maintaining the quantity, and building quality of the viola studio, Dr. Kimberly Sparr will be well along the way toward the ultimate goal of promotion and tenure.

Teaching Self-Appraisal

I am proud of my ideas and feel that I am able to clearly communicate with my students. I believe that I am teaching much more than just music. I am setting them up to be professional performers and educators. I push them because I care and I have high expectations for their success. I have had to deal with some interesting situations but, by being patient and supportive, I am able to navigate and steer students in the right direction. My students inspire me and they inspire each other.

I am very excited to report that I hosted my "dream" viola weekend (Viola Rodeo) in October 2017. This celebration of the viola was comprised of: two sessions of wellness for violists — with guest kripalu yoga instructor Clare Howard, a viola "Play-In" (all attendees invited) focusing on viola ensemble repertoire, three masterclasses (two by guest artist Jason Bonham and one by me), a joint guest artist/faculty recital, and our TTU Viola Rodeo studio recital. Every one of my students performed on the studio recital. This gave the students a chance to bond and celebrate our instrument.

I am continuing with my annual studio project. This year we are focusing on arpeggios. I am having graduate students share their repertoire and pedagogy research projects with our studio. My graduate students are studying and writing in depth about interesting topics such as: arts and wellness, contemporary repertoire, technique through orchestral excerpts, and performance practice. Because my students are playing at a much higher level, I am able to collaborate and perform with them. I performed Bowen's Fantasy Quartet with three of my graduate students on our studio recital.

Several of my students attended prestigious summer music festivals including: National Orchestral Institute, Brevard Music Center, Orvieto (Italy) Chamber Music Program, National Music Festival. Graduate student Alicia Keener was named the James Collier Britt Orchestra 2017 viola fellow this past summer. Their acceptance in to these high profile programs is very encouraging and makes me happy to realize that they are playing comparatively well with other viola students in the country

I am happy to have been awarded the 2017 Raiders Who Rock Unsung Hero Award from Texas Tech University. My students nominated me for this award.

The fellows form a chamber ensemble, choose their own repertoire, and provide outreach performances in the southern Oregon community.

Research and Creative Scholarship

Research and Creative Self-Appraisal

The nature of a violist is to provide support and balance. Our middle register is most often the inner voice, harmony, and sits in the center of the sound in orchestral and chamber repertoire. I played this role for a number of years but this year decided to push myself to explore my own originality as a solo artist. I completed the Liquid Fire video for electric viola and electronics. I performed Jennifer Higdon's Concerto with the University Symphony Orchestra. I was honored to be the second violist ever to have played this piece with orchestra. I performed Brandenburg 6 with one of my festival apprentices from Yale at the National Music Festival. I was principal viola for a new string orchestra recording of Verklärte Nacht for Naxos. I collaborated with TTU SWE at TMEA (on electric viola). I continued to perform with the Atlantic Chamber Ensemble. Our concerts are becoming more exploratory and we received a \$30,000 grant from the Blank Foundation towards a new commission by Mason Bates. I served on the faculty of the National Music Festival. My duo (Farny/Sparr) was awarded a residency at Avaloch where we worked with Caroline Mallonee on a new piece. I commissioned two new pieces this year ("ABC" for viola and electronics by Molly Joyce and "Storm King Suite" for cello/viola duo by Caroline Mallonee). I gave a joint viola recital at TTU with guest artist Jason Bonham and performed with new faculty. I played with top notch musicians from all over the country at Colorado Music Festival. At CMF, I performed the Brahms Clarinet Quintet with the principal clarinetist of the Los Angeles Philharmonic. I performed and taught masterclasses at universities in Las Vegas (UNLV) and Richmond (VCU). At one point in the fall semester of 2017, I was performing a different duo

each week on TTU faculty members' recitals. I believe that my colleagues seek opportunities to perform with me because of my engaging musicianship and collaborative spirit. The duo works I played (Koetsier with trumpet, Clarke with clarinet, and Zare with saxophone) were all challenging and obscure but I have very much enjoyed discovering new configurations and sounds through collaboration. Through this year's performances, I have discovered a new persona – one that is entirely confident and excited to explore my individuality and creativity and to contribute to my field.

In addition, I reviewed the numerical ratings in the various research categories and found them to be appropriate and made modifications where necessary. Coupled with my direct interaction during the calendar year 2017, these materials provide the basis for the following review. Dr. Sparr is non-tenured, holding the rank of Assistant Professor, with teaching responsibilities in viola.

Teaching 50%

Dr. Sparr has developed a very strong studio that continues to excel. She makes strategic use of graduate students in their designed interaction with the undergraduates in multiple aspects of their degree programs. She is also very aware of each of her students' individual needs and abilities. Her holistic approach in developing the complete musician is apparent in their performances.

Her student evaluations of course and instructor indicate both through written comments and numeric data that Dr. Sparr is valued and respected. Primary Unit Evaluation Report for 2017

After reviewing the Annual Report Submitted by Dr. Sparr, student evaluations, observing an applied lesson, along with performances with the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra, the committee provides the following assessment:

Dr. Kimberly Sparr continues to be on track towards tenure. 2017 was another strong year for her and we can't imagine a better viola professor for Texas Tech. Kimberly's students agree as they nominated her for and she won the 2017 Raiders Who Rock Unsung Hero Award.

TEACHING

Now in her fifth academic year (2017-18) at Texas Tech, Dr. Sparr has maintained a healthy sized viola class of 13 viola majors as of Spring 2018. Based on student comments, Dr. Sparr is overwhelmingly loved, appreciated, and respected. Her perfect score in student evaluation numbers attest to this as well. In her effort to teach more than just music, Dr. Sparr empathetically and expertly addresses student psychology of performance stress, and managing the inevitable failure that all musicians have to face. She is very encouraging when the student makes progress. Appropriately uses humor to connect personally with the student and lighten the atmosphere - all in the service of teaching. These qualities establish a personable rapport with her students. She answers questions clearly and unambiguously.

Dr. Sparr's significant professional orchestral experience is apparent in her instruction, in particular with orchestral excerpts. She correctly identified bow stroke issues and solutions. She superbly demonstrates for the student, at times playing the students instrument and bow to get a feel for what the student is dealing with, even allowing the student to play on her own personal bow. She makes excellent suggestions for student practice technique. Dr. Sparr also contributes to the students' career development in arranging the business for student success (i.e. recording for summer festivals, etc.). Evidence of student success is found with two more students hired by the Lubbock Symphony. Four students were accepted into prestigious summer festivals, including one that received a fellowship, which validates that they are playing comparatively well with other viola students in the country. She successfully presented and performed in her Viola Rodeo that involved Wellness (yoga), Chamber music, Masterclasses and Recitals. All students performed at this event.

RESEARCH

Professor Sparr has very impressive contributions to the Creative/Research arena for 2017 with many important performances at all levels, but especially as a solo and collaborative artist with four performances falling at the Ranking = 4 level.

Highlights include: Liquid Fire video for electric viola; the Higdon Concerto with the USO (she was only the second person to perform this work with orchestra); Principal Violist for a Naxos recording of Verklarte Nacht; Performance on electric viola with TTU's Wind Ensemble at TMEA; At the Colorado Music Festival, she performed the Brahms Clarinet Quintet with the principal clarinetist of the

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Los Angeles Philharmonic. She also performed and taught masterclasses at UNLV and VCU. Kimberly also collaborated with many TTU faculty on their solo recitals. Her colleagues seek her out because of her engaging musicianship and collaborative spirit. As part of her commitment to new music, Dr. Sparr commissioned two new works.

As an orchestral musician, Dr. Sparr was principal viola of the Colorado Music Festival and the National Music Festival Orchestra in Chestertown, MD. Locally, she is a valued section leader as principal viola of the Lubbock Symphony.

This committee fully supports Dr. Sparr's continued performing appearances at the local, state, regional, national and international levels.

SERVICE

She has increased the service component of her dossier, which is impressive especially considering she became a foster parent in April of 2017. Her list of service activities include: served on the University-wide Laura Cavazos and Ophelia Powell-Malone Mentoring Program. At the College level served on the Deans Advisory Committee and the Awards and Research Committee. At the Departmental level she organized masterclasses/guest artists, and served on 12 recital committees. She also served on the boards of the Caerus Ensemble and the Atlantic Chamber Ensemble.

OVERALL

Dr. Sparr is a valued colleague of the string faculty team and at Texas Tech. Her goals for next year are outstanding.

Dr. Kimberly Sparr continues to improve the quality and quantity of her studio. She is a performer of national recognition and is making excellent progress towards tenure.
